# Monthly Homeowner's Fee Increases

The Dominion Club Board reluctantly set the 2010 Dominion Club Homeowner's monthly fee at \$130.00, an increase of \$10 per month. While the 2010 operating budget is increased only \$1,460 over the 2009 budget, income has dropped this last year with four homeowners unable to pay their monthly fee. Projecting income in 2010 from only 96 homeowners requires a \$5.00 per month increase in the homeowner's fee.

In addition, the board has had to take money from the reserve fund to cover our lawyer's fees for the pending law suit and other expenses. In 2006 a reserve fund study was undertaken that projected repair and replacement costs for the club house and pool.

Reserve fund bench marks were set to cover these anticipated expenses over a twenty year period. At the end of 2009 we will be \$13,500 short of the study's bench mark of \$38,435. This is the cause for the second \$5.00 per month increase in the homeowner's fee.

While it is hoped, but uncertain, that the lawyer's fees will eventually be reimbursed and the back monthly fees paid, the board felt it was important to both balance the 2010 budget and temporarily increase the monthly contribution to the reserve fund in order to bring that balance more in line with the study recommendations.

Hanukkah celebrates Jewish national survival and freedom. 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### Snow Removal 2009-2010

As we approach another snow season, here are some items to remember. If you want more details, go to the Snow Removal file on the website, dominionclub.org.

In late November or early December, our contractor, Abbruzzese, will install snow stakes to mark the areas of our driveways where snow removal is to be done. If any stakes have been knocked down or are leaning, please reposition or straighten them before the next snow removal is performed. These stakes also play an important role in the warranty for damage claims involving snow removal by the contractor.

Please check your driveway after each snow removal and report any damage within 3 days of any snow removal event. Report the damage to Dave Ewing, at ewing\_david@sbcglobal.net before the expiration of the 72 hour damage report window.

He will notify the contractor, and a joint site visit/damage assessment will be arranged.

These two criteria establish when the contractor will come to remove the snow:

- 1. Snow accumulation is over 2 inches on a flat, level/open place (NOT DRIFTS). The official snow depth will be measured on the front sidewalk at 6935 Joysmith Circle.
- The snow event has ended.

In the event (usually larger snow events) that our contractor finishes plowing and clearing before the Village snowplows come, our contractor is not liable for piles of snow the village may leave at the end of our driveways. To avoid damaging your car, get the larger "chunks" of snow/ice over to the side of your driveway entrance before that evening's freeze. If chunks

freeze solid, they are very difficult to move.

Calls / complaints to the village may generate a follow-up visit by their village crews if they have blocked your driveway. The village service center number is 855-0076. The New Albany Police Nonemergency number is 855-1234.

To minimize damage to the driveway and sealcoat, manually operated snow blowers will be used on the driveways whenever the accumulated snowfall is less than 6 inches. When the accumulation is 6 inches or more, frontend loaders will be used. Sealcoat damage is not covered by the contractor.

The homeowners on the current "Do not plow" list will not have their driveways cleared. If you want on that list, e-mail Dave Ewing.

The contractor does not apply salt/icemelt to homeowner's sidewalks because it within 3 days of any can damage the concrete. You can apply your own salt/ice-melt but you are responsible for any damage it causes. A better choice would be to use "Road or Paver Base" sand that can be purchased at Home Depot.




We first visited the Charm Countryview Inn in the second year after it opened,
