Navigating the Complex Medical System

On January 23rd about 30 of our neighbors gathered at the club house to hear a presentation from Jeffrey Milks, MD on navigating the health care system. He was sponsored through the Healthy New Albany magazine and this was just one of several lectures being given in New Albany, usually at the Jeanne B. McCoy Theater. Because of our age demographics Martha Campbell was approached to have the lecture here. Dr. and Mrs. Milks are residents of the Links living in the community just east of the Dominion Club and his office is near the Mt. Carmel Surgical Hospital.

He is Board Certified in Family Practice, Board Certified in Geriatrics, Board Certified in Hospice and Palliative Care, and is affiliated with Riverside Hospital and also teaches at the Ohio State University. Dr. Milks did a power point presentation with the assistance of Alex Campbell and provided handouts. He encouraged us all to take charge of our health care by practicing healthy lifestyles and to become an informed healthcare consumer. Selecting a good healthcare provider is very important. Use your insurance company or the Internet to find prospective providers. Use professional associations and consumer reviews. Information is not always readily available but looking is worthwhile. Make an effort to communicate effectively with your healthcare providers—make a list before appointments to ensure all

issues are covered. Bring someone with you to an appointment or bring a tape recorder—most practitioners won't mind. The goal is for you to get the most out of each appointment, especially recommended actions and issues for vou to address. The internet is another source for good medical information and he suggested several useful sites including Wikipedia, Web MD and the Mayo Clinic. Any information obtained should be discussed with your physician because he or she can best interpret the information considering your condition or illness. The prevention and treatment of Alzheimer's was discussed and at the present time there is nothing one can do to prevent the illness and treatment is marginally effective. He did offer one word of encouragement research found that those who enjoy eating out seem to be less likely to develop Alzheimer's, which was very good news to several of us. Dr. Milks was very good to answer questions and explain his thoughts.

Chinese New Year "Year of the Snake"

Chinese New Year is the longest and most important festivity in the Chinese calendar. The origin of Chinese New Year is itself centuries old and gains significance because of several myths and traditions. Chinese New Year is celebrated in China and in countries and territories with significant Chinese populations, including Hong Kong, Macau, Singapore, Thailand, Indonesia, Malaysia, Taiwan, Mauritius, Philippines, and also in Chinatowns elsewhere. Chinese New Year is considered a major holiday for the Chinese and has had influence on the lunar new year celebrations of its geographic neighbors.

Within China, regional customs and traditions concerning the celebration of the Chinese new year vary widely. People will pour out their money to buy presents, decorations, food, and clothing. It is also traditional for every family to thoroughly cleanse the house, in order to sweep away any ill-fortune and to make way for good incoming luck. Windows and doors

will be decorated with red color papercuts and couplets with popular themes of
"good fortune" or "happiness", "wealth",
and "longevity." On the Eve of Chinese
New Year, supper is a feast with families.
Food will include such items as pork,
duck, chicken and sweet delicacies. The
family will end the night with firecrackers.
Early the next morning, children will greet
their parents by wishing them a healthy
and happy new year, and receive money
in red paper envelopes. The Chinese New
Year tradition is to reconcile, forget all
grudges and sincerely wish peace and
happiness for everyone.

Although the Chinese calendar traditionally does not use continuously numbered years, outside China its years are often numbered from the reign of the Yellow Emperor. But at least three different years numbered 1 are now used by various scholars, making the year beginning February 10, 2013 AD the "Chinese Year" 4711, 4710, or 4650.






Vernal Equinox, March 20

An equinox occurs twice a year (around 20 March and 22 September), when the tilt of the Earth's axis is inclined neither away from nor towards the Sun, the center of the Sun being in the same plane as the Earth's equator. The name "equinox" is derived from the Latin aequus (equal) and nox (night), because around the equinox, night and day are about equal length.

When Julius Caesar established his calendar in 45 BC, he set March 25 as the spring equinox. Since a Julian year (365.25 days) is slightly longer than an actual year the calendar drifted with respect to the equinox, such that the equinox was occurring on about 21 March in AD 300 and by AD 1500 it had reached 11 March.

The shift to March 11 induced Pope Greg-

ory XIII to create a modern Gregorian calendar. The Pope was moved by the desire to restore the edicts concerning the date of Easter of the Council of Nicaea of AD 325. (Incidentally, the date of Easter itself is fixed by an approximation of lunar cycles used in the Hebraic calendar). So, the shift in the date of the equinox that occurred between the 4th and the 16th centuries was annulled with the Gregorian calendar, but nothing was done for the first four centuries of the Julian calendar. The days of 29 February of the years AD 100, AD 200, AD 300, and the day created by the irregular application of leap years between the assassination of Caesar and the decree of Augustus rearranging the calendar in AD 8, remained in effect. This moved the equinox four days earlier than in Caesar's time.
